The President's Corner

Today is the first day of September and that signals that summer is drawing to a close. Whether your key is Labor Day, the kids going back to school, or trees changing color, I hope everyone had a good summer. This month our regular club meetings resume. We have been working on the program schedule and it is pretty solid for the rest of the year.

With the hot summer, I didn't complete much of the antenna work that I had planned. But with the cooler weather maybe I can catch up on some of that...?

The one thing I did accomplish was putting together a mobile/portable station to use activating some of the local National Parks for the National Parks On The Air (NPOTA) activity. Mobile HF operation is a challenge and it was a good learning experience on a range of topics. There are mobile and portable antennas, power sources, tuners, and radio set up. There is also the consideration

of creating a comfortable operating position to spend hours operating.

My station is set up to operate from the back (middle) seat of the van. The computer and tuner sit on a shelf between the front seats at a reasonable typing height. The radio is on a shelf below. The batteries (three 35AH sealed type) are under the seat and are paralleled and feed the rig through a battery booster.

Most of my operating has been solo, but this is the location Skip K1NKR and I operated together most recently. It's is the Lamprey National Wild and Scenic River (WR23) in Epping, New Hampshire.

Running full power for many hours, with much of it transmitting, the batteries fall to a level where my radio first starts exhibiting what appears to be RF in the audio and eventually actually resets. This is one thing I had planned for by installing a "battery booster. The boosters have different modes of operation in order to save power. When they are "off" the booster is bypassed. In the "on" mode it maintains 13.8 volts on the output. In the third mode it detects RF from the transmitter and only boosts the voltage during transmit since that is when the battery voltage can drop significantly. It would have worked flawlessly and transparently if I had turned it on! In this case, once we identified the problem switching it on was all it took to return to normal operation. As an operational note, I didn't hear any interference that I could associate with this particular battery booster.

Since mobile antennas are so poor we took advantage of the available antenna

supports (*aka* trees)and raised 20 and 40 meter dipoles, something I couldn't do at the Lowell National Park.




